Keep the social impact on not only the Westshore community but all beach/reserve users in mind. 5. Local & Recreational User: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> o Status Quo: whilst it is a short term measure it <u>can't</u> continue due to <u>cost access</u> to material and effect on other environments where it's being extracted from. o Included "Renourishment from Port Dredging": change the consent to allow for an extended dump zone. North end of beach where dumping takes place is eroding less. Consent can be changed. Change the <u>attitude</u> of the "Port of Napier". Trial dumping further south. Use ½ barge loads to allow access in water levels. Napier Port needs to support the community. o Breakwaters: combinations to allow for beach growth and reduce impact upon other areas. o Offshore Reefs. <p>This process needs to create action and not return to another "let's wait & see" or another consultation process. Please make a decision to create some <u>action</u>.</p>

	<p>Westshore Napier 4110 6 June 2017 & See photos (2 photos provided) My submission re Coastal Hazards Charles Street Waterfront. I submit 2 points (& 1 point)</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. At present from in front of my place on corner James Street/Charles Street (roughly) there are pleasant "DRUID PATHWAYS" ie. Pathways formed materially by walkers along grassy area – These should be retained and/or reinstated after any damage during rockwork. Do <u>not</u> put boardwalks, gravel or concrete as these detract from the natural experience for walkers. 2. I submit my support for planting with <u>totally appropriate dune plants</u> along landward side of present stop banks from approx. James Street and heading north along Bay. Some earth/sand would need to be placed to allow plants to take. Plants – in Mt Maunganui eg fore dune plants are Pingao & Spinifex, both of which sweep like long hair brushing the beach during high surf or a storm and having long stalks can quickly recover & regrow. Also fore dune has a NZ convolvulus type plant that gives NZ. Hind dune has a few of the above but also Muelen bechia and reeds and rushes, Mulen bechia (wire grass) provides root systems than can live eg. 10 metres below dune surface. These provide incredible stability to dunes. In Southern areas NZ eg. New Plymouth Spinifex does not thrive. Marram grass is more clump forming than spinifex and does not send out long 'feelers'. I am not sure which is more appropriate in Napier. Marram is good on West Coast beaches eg, Muriwai. The correct one is essential to success of planting. 3. Options suggested I would prefer the more aesthetic methods: see Appendix 1 I prefer: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2 Planting • 4 Inter-tidal renourishment (Sand) • 6 Beach Scraping <p>Other: I received flyer in letterbox – statement re blocks along Charles St to a few properties short of my place – 20 Charles St. I expect this will further erode my corner of the bay.
